As we come to the end of the dog days of summer, you can almost feel a subtle shift in the air. There is just a little more energy, vim and vigor. The publishing world perks up too as it starts to anticipate the release of some of the biggest books of the year. To give you a feel, here is a sample of the impressively large number of new novels scheduled to be published in September:

Amity by Nathan Harris — In the aftermath of the Civil War, two siblings try to reunite after one is kidnapped and taken to Mexico by her former slave owner.



The Book of Guilt by Catherine Chidgey — In an alternate version of England in which WWII has ended in a stalemate, 13-year old triplets are the sole survivors of a disease that devastated the orphanage where they live.

Circle of Days by Ken Follett — The continuation of the bestselling series about three Neolithic people who come together to begin the construction of Stonehenge.

Clown Town by Mick Herron — The 9th book in the bestselling Slow Horses series, now streaming on Apple TV+.

A Different Kind of Tension by Jonathan Lethem — A short-story collection that shifts between realism and the surreal and between the absurd and the mundane.



The Elements by John Boyne — Four interconnected narratives, each representing a different perspective on crime: the enabler, the accomplice, the perpetrator and the victim.

Guilty by Definition by Susie Dent — A team of lexicographers working at a famous dictionary publishing house are sent letters with clues to a decades-old secret.

The Impossible Fortune by Richard Osman — The 5th installment in the #1 bestselling Thursday Murder Club series, soon to be a TV miniseries streaming on Netflix.

The Killer Question by Janice Hallett — An amateur-sleuth story set in a pub during trivia night, where the clues are revealed through the quiz categories as well as messages and emails.



The Loneliness of Sonia and Sunny by Kiran Desai
— An Indian couple pursue love and success on their
own terms both in the U.S. and in their homeland.
Longlisted for the 2025 Booker Prize for fiction.

Mercy by Joan Silber — Two pairs of friends are connected by a tiny moment in the emergency room of St. Vincent's hospital in New York City.




One of Us by Dan Chaon — 13-year-old orphaned twins join the circus while on the run from an evil con man in America in 1915.

The Phoebe Variations by Jane Hamilton — A straight A high school senior's world is upended by her adoptive mother's insistence that she meet her biological mother.

Revenge of Odessa by Frederick Forsyth and Tony Kent — The long-awaited sequel to the #1 bestselling spy thriller The Odessa File.

Ripeness by Sarah Moss — An Irish woman's best friend is contacted by a previously-unknown older brother who was adopted and raised in America and now wants to "see where he comes from."



The Secret of Secrets by Dan Brown — After a professor of symbology travels to Prague to attend a lecture by a scientist with whom he has recently begun a relationship, he is targeted by a powerful organization.

Vianne by Joanne Harris — This return to the world of the bestselling novel (and Oscar-nominated film adaptation) *Chocolat* is set six years before

Vianne first opened her chocolate shop in a small French village.

We Love You, Bunny by Mona Awad — In this sequel to the bestselling *Bunny*, Samantha Heather Mackey leaves academia and heads out on her first book tour as a published author.



What We Can Know by Ian McEwan — Survivors of a nuclear disaster in 2119 England become fixated on an enigmatic love poem written in 2014.

The Wilderness by Angela Flournoy — Five Black women who share a lifelong bond attempt to navigate the trials of middle age.

Will There Ever Be Another You by Patricia Lockwood — A writer grapples with the debilitating long-term effects of Covid-19.

Last Words:

To the Trains from Chris Ciemniewski




Although it may not be evident today, the United States owes much of its early economic success to steam trains. During the industrial revolution trains were instrumental in transporting materials and people around a vast and growing country. Not too long afterward, electric streetcars popped up in American cities, beginning in Richmond, VA and spreading to cities like New Haven and even Wallingford to further assist in getting people from their front doors to their destinations in

a world without automobiles. While larger cities like New York eventually implemented and retained their metro networks, the trains and trolleys that led the country to prosperity have been largely supplanted by the Interstate system and automobiles. In his book *Autophobia*, Brian Ladd had these sentiments to offer on this uniquely American phenomenon:



"Cars are the scourge of civilization, responsible for everything from suburban sprawl and urban decay to environmental devastation and rampant climate change... Some thirty million people were killed in car accidents during the twentieth century—plus the countless number of hours we waste in gridlock traffic commuting to work, running errands, picking up our kids, and searching for parking, and one can't help but ask: Haven't we had enough already?"



Let's leave behind the diesel-scented asphalt roads for a moment and recall a time when public transit was the future. To the trains! Christian Wolmar's set of text-heavy books *The Iron Road* and *The Great Railroad Revolution* offer a definitive history of trains in America. Included are maps of railroads across the nation from different decades which show the progress and cessation of the rails as they made their way from the coasts to the interior. The

story of America's railroads begins with necessity: in order for the country's industry to expand, it needed to build rails to transport materials—and people would soon follow. It became every large city and small town's dream to be connected to the growing railway network and the progress that came with it.



While Wolmar's books capture the spirit of American locomotion as it took off across the country, Peter E. Lynch's **New Haven Railroad** focuses solely on Connecticut's most historic railroad system. Local history buffs will love this collection of stories and images of the New Haven Railroad from the 1880s through the 1960s. The main text describes the history of the railroad in a way that all readers can understand, while pictorial captions give

more technical descriptions of the engines and rolling stock.

The coffee table-sized book *The Last Steam Railroad in America* contains a beautiful assortment of high quality color and black and white photos taken by O. Winston Link with text by Thomas H. Garver. The book captures both the charm and melancholy of the last years of the steam engines, particularly images of passengers and crew. Landscape shots

depicting steam engines passing through autumnal hills, golden wheat fields, and snowy valleys, leaving a billowing trail of smoke in their wake, invoke a distinctly Americana ambience.

Train: The Evolution of Rail Travel by Philip Marsh focuses on technological advancements and cultural significance of railroads throughout time across all continents. The book highlights important milestones along the way and contains pages of historical photos, travel posters, illustrations of long-gone structures, and architectural blueprints. The book bears the same charm as reading through a homemade scrapbook of collected memorabilia







For even more railroad realia, Brad S. Lomazzi's *Railroad* offers a collection of timetables, travel brochures, and posters from defunct railroad networks. Written as a guide for collectors, the reproductions will also appeal to frequent travelers and American history buffs alike. If you're into maps, *Transit Maps of the World* by Mark Ovenden

is a complete collection of every urban train map on Earth, organized by the amount of marketing material available for each system. Containing maps from every major city in the world, the book describes in detail the evolution of each

map's design.



—And what would the railroads be without their stations? Jill Jonnes' **Conquering Gotham** describes the construction of one of the most legendary lost train stations: New York's Penn Station. Jonnes examines how the gilded age made the station's construction possible, what made it so remarkable, and what made the loss of the original station so devastating. More familiar to contemporary travelers is Grand Central Station. In **Grand Central: Gateway to a Million Lives** authors John

Belle and Maxinne R. Leighton provide the biography of one of the world's most recognizable train stations and how it became "grand." Along with detailed 3D maps and cross-sections, the book touches on different facets of the station such as architectural and artistic details, its adjoining real estate, and its place in the collective

minds of American travelers.



Once you arrive in Grand Central Station, (nearly) all of New York City is accessible via a robust subway system! **Subway Style**, a collection of photographs from Andrew Garn, hones in on the often overlooked details of the

New York City subway—the things fast-moving travelers may not notice such as tile work, stone reliefs, wrought iron gates, lighting fixtures, benches, signage, and other artwork. For well seasoned subway riders, the book may be fun to flip through to see how many details you recognize! *Training Days* from Thames & Hudson similarly focuses on the many graffiti murals found throughout the subway system and contains brief bios and profiles of the artists who made them. The New

York City subway is infamously known for its eclectic riders. Brian Young's *The Train 1984* and Peter Peter's *The Subway Pictures* are coffee table books which draw attention to the amazing and unusual denizens of the subways cars as the subjects of these photo collections. While these two collections contain only images, *Between the Lines* by Uli Beutter Cohen features a collection of interviews with travelers on the New York subway system. In particular, the interviews focus on what subway passengers are reading, where they are heading, and their thoughts on the city, which offers readers insight into their fellow travelers' psyches.

This list would not be complete without mention of model railroad enthusiasts.

The Lionel Legend by Robert Schleicher offers a glimpse into this niche hobby for railroad lovers. Each page of this 253 page book focuses on a different engine, car, or lineside structure such as stations, water towers, or lumber mills. Enthusiasts will appreciate

the comprehensiveness of the collection, while casual readers will be enthralled by the attention to detail in these miniature railroads.

I hope this month's column inspires you to board a train here at Wallingford Station to visit **The Libraries of the Hartford Line** (more info on the back cover) and rediscover the joy of traveling the iron roads.
