




Blind Sushi:

A Screening & Tasting with Chef Bun Lai

Monday, Oct 27th | 7-9pm | Community Room | Register

After a brief business meeting, join us for a screening of the award-winning 17-minute documentary *Blind Sushi*! This short film, directed by Eric Heimbold of "Who Let the Dogs Out" music video fame, follows blind travel writer Ryan Knighton and Chef Bun Lai as they dive into the murky waters of Long Island Sound in search of ingredients to create a meal that is as enlightening as it is delicious. The screening will be followed by a tasting of **Chef Bun Lai**'s innovative and sustainable sushi creations and a lively conversation exploring the relationship between food, health, society, and the environment.

Chef Bun Lai is the recipient of the 2016 White House Champion of Change Award for Sustainable Seafood and a James Beard Award nominee. His family restaurant Miya's, founded by his mother, Yoshiko Lai, in 1982, is the first sustainable sushi restaurant in the world. Miya's specializes in sustainable seafood-based sushi, plant-based sushi, and invasive species-based sushi.

Malala Yousafzai

Finding My Way Wednesday, Oct 22nd | 7-8 pm | Zoom | Register

Thrust onto the public stage when she was 15 after the Taliban's attack on her life, Malala Yousafzai became an international icon known for bravery and resilience. But away from the cameras and crowds, she spent years struggling to find her place in an unfamiliar world. Her new memoir *Finding My Way* is a story of friendship and first love, of anxiety and self-discovery, of trying to stay true to yourself when everyone wants to tell you who you are. In it, Malala traces her path from high school loner to reckless college student to a young woman at peace with her past. Through candid, often messy moments like nearly failing exams, getting ghosted, and meeting the love of her life, Malala reminds us that real role models aren't perfect—they're human.

Malala Yousafzai is an education activist, the youngest-ever Nobel laureate, bestselling author, and award-winning film producer. She was born in Mingora, Pakistan, in 1997 and graduated from Oxford University in 2020.

Philippa Gregory Courtly Intrigue and Whispers as Weapons Wednesday, Oct 29th | 2-3pm | Zoom | Register

Philippa Gregory returns to the infamous Tudor Court in her new novel *Boleyn Traitor*. Jane Boleyn watches from the shadows of the Tudor Court, where secrets are currency, every choice is dangerous, and even the faintest whisper can seal the fate of queens. For Jane, survival demands playing every role required of her: a loving wife who conceals her doubts, a devoted sister to Anne Boleyn at the height of her power, and an obedient spy who carefully wields her words. But in a court ruled by ambition and a tyrant's sword, Jane must rely on her sharp wit and skillful maneuvering to outthink those around her, knowing that one wrong move could cost her everything.

Dr. Philippa Gregory is one of the world's foremost historical novelists and has written many bestselling novels, including *The Other Boleyn Girl* and *The White Queen*. She studied history at the University of Sussex and was awarded a PhD by the University of Edinburgh. In 2021, she was awarded a CBE for services to literature and was elected as a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society.

For online research, **Ancestry Library Edition** and **American Ancestors** (available for in-library use) provide access to billions of records, including census, vital, military, court, immigration, and other types of official records, as well as local directories, obituaries, photos, and much more. **Newspapers.com by Ancestry** (available for in-library use) provides online access to historical newspapers including *The Meriden Journal*, *The Meriden Daily Republican*, *The Meriden Weekly Republican*, and the *Record-Journal*.

Want to preserve your family documents, photos, and videos for future generations? The **Collaboratory** offers a variety of equipment to digitize your VHS and audio cassettes, LPs, photographs, slides, negatives, and 8 mm film. Wondering what to do with those boxes and boxes of old slides? Borrow our **slide scanner** to create digital copies of glass slides, 35mm slides, film negatives, or flatbed slides. Additionally, the **Connecticut Collection** preserves Wallingford's history for public research. This collection includes photos, postcards, newspaper clippings, pamphlets, brochures, maps, school yearbooks, town directories, genealogies and more. 
Classics Book Club



Volety What's new in novels from Cindy Haiken

In her magnificent novel *Enlightenment*, Sarah Perry writes: "The faithless swifts had gone: it was the restless period between summer and autumn, when it was never possible to guess the weather or dress correctly for it." As September draws to a close and autumn officially arrives in New England, the fall publishing season shifts into high gear, with enough amazing-sounding new novels scheduled for publication in October to fill most of the pages in this newsletter! Here is a small sample of the great reads we have to look forward to this month:



Bad Bad Girl by Gish Jen — Two immigrants from Shanghai to New York meet in the late 1940s, marry and have children, one of whom grows up being told constantly that she is a "bad, bad girl."

Big Kiss, Bye-Bye by Claire-Louise Bennett — A woman who has moved to the country after a breakup reflects on her past loves.

Bog Queen by Anna North — An American forensic anthropologist investigates the surprising discovery of Iron Age human remains in England.

The Devil Is a Southpaw by Brandon Hobson — A man becomes obsessed with a Cherokee artist he was once locked up with when he was sent to a detention center as a young boy.

The Dogs of Venice by Steven Rowley — A heartbroken man takes a solo vacation to Venice and unexpectedly bonds with a dog.

The Elopement by Gill Hornby — A woman's quiet life is upended when her widowed father remarries into a large and boisterous family.



Gone before Goodbye by Reese Witherspoon and Harlan Coben — A disgraced Army surgeon starts working under the table as a plastic surgeon for wealthy people and discovers that the work is more dangerous than she expected.

Heart the Lover by Lily King — A successful middleaged novelist reminisces about her senior year of college when she lived in a professor's empty house with two male classmates.

I Am Cleopatra by Natasha Solomons — A fictional retelling of the life of the Egyptian queen Cleopatra, from her childhood to her fight to keep the throne.



The Land of Sweet Forever by Harper Lee — A collection of early short stories and later nonfiction writing by the beloved novelist.

The Last Death of the Year by Sophie Hannah — In the 6th Agatha Christie homage mystery, Hercule Poirot struggles with a murder investigation during a New Year's Eve party.

Looking for Tank Man by Ha Jin — A Harvard student from China discovers the fraught, hidden history of the Tiananmen Square massacre.

Minor Black Figures by Brandon Taylor — A Black painter from the South tries to navigate New York City's tight-knit art world.

Mrs. Wilson's Affair by Allyson Reedy — A retelling of *The Great Gatsby* from the perspective of Myrtle Wilson, Tom Buchanan's mistress



Shadow Ticket by Thomas Pynchon – An American private investigator goes searching for a missing heiress in Europe in the 1930s, and things do not go to plan.

Tom's Crossing by Mark Danielewski — Two friends in 1980s Utah head out on a mission to rescue a pair of horses that are scheduled to be slaughtered.



Twice by Mitch Albom — A man has the magical ability to do things over. He can rewind any moment and live it again, except for love; in that case, if he undoes it once, it is gone forever.

Venetian Vespers by John Banville — In the early 20th century, a pair of newlyweds escape to Venice after learning of their disinheritance but find themselves in sinister circumstances.

The Wayfinder by Adam Johnson — During the height of the Tu'i Tonga Empire in the Polynesian islands of the South Pacific, a young girl goes on a quest to save her people.

What a Way to Go by Bella Mackie — After a wealthy man is impaled by a spear-like decoration at his 60th birthday party, he is trapped in a bureaucratic purgatory until he can recall the exact details of his death.



Wreck by Catherine Newman — This sequel to the bestselling *Sandwich* is set two years in the future in Rocky's hometown in Western Massachusetts.

Edible Adaptations from Chris Ciemniewski

With so many great food events this month and with Thanksgiving (and Friendsgiving!) just around the corner, I went searching the library's collection for some of the most interesting and whimsical cookbooks!



Planning a spooky gathering for Halloween? **Hocus Pocus: The Official Cookbook** might be what you're looking for to create memorable and chilling treats for your guests (especially if they are also *Hocus Pocus* fans!). The book contains many fall favorites from appetizers to desserts, with most including creepy garnishes or decorative ideas to make the plates look extra spooky!

And if you're a *Hocus Pocus* fan, you may also be a Disney fan! Disney's *Enchanted Recipes* is organized into four sections: Disney Princess inspired recipes, European cuisine, global cuisine, and other fanciful dishes (dubbed the "Wonderland" section in the book). Callbacks to dishes in Disney movies include Kronk's Spinach Puffs, Tiana's Beignets and Gumbo, Remy's Ratatouille, Kanine Crunchies, Mrs. Judson's Crumpets, and Creme de la Creme de la Edgar. Other dishes have



a resemblance to the specific character or to the film they are derived from such as Ariel's Milkshake or Stroke of Midnight Pumpkin Soup. Still others are existing dishes with a Disney twist, such as kebabs, tamales, spaghetti, and even sushi!



The Studio Ghibli Cookbook similarly contains recipes from the anime studio's films so that fans can remake the dishes at home. This cookbook's recipes are simple, requiring only a few steps and a handful of ingredients making them family-friendly and possibly a great follow-up activity to watching one of the studio's celebrated films. The book is split into two sections—main dishes and desserts—and includes recipes such as

Howl's Bacon & Eggs, Totoro's Bento, Tuna Onigiri, and Beef Stroganoff. Each recipe includes some background on the film it is from.



Anime fans won't want to miss **Pirate Recipes by Sanji**, a cookbook inspired by *Once Piece* or **Avatar: The Last Airbender Official Cookbook**. Sanji's cookbook includes many Asian and seafood inspired dishes which coincides with the anime and manga's pirate theme. As you flip through the book you will also find mini comic strips and commentary on each recipe from Sanji and other *One Piece* characters. The

Avatar cookbook is split into four sections for each of the four Nations within the series: The Fire Nation, The Water Tribes, the Earth Kingdom, and the Air Nomads. Each of the four sections offers a variety of courses, giving readers (and chefs) an idea of what the cuisine of each fictional region might be like! For instance, many Water Tribe recipes focus on seafood and stews, while Fire Nation recipes emphasize grilling.



There might be no better cookbook for a friendsgiving than the **Friends Official Cookbook** inspired by the 90s television sitcom. While it is less



overtly themed than some of the other cookbooks on this list, each dish is pulled right out of the show, with the season, episode number, and title appearing at the top of each recipe. The recipes are even arranged in chronological order of appearance on the show, making it easy to theme a dinner party around specific episodes or season. One section even includes full menu plans based on the characters of Chandler and Monica.

For a more sophisticated dinner party you might try **The Official Downton Abbey Cookbook**. The book is divided into "upstairs" and "downstairs" recipes with the "upstairs" containing specialized menus such as breakfast, lunch, supper, afternoon tea, garden party, picnics, race meets, and multicourse dinners. The cookbook embraces the show's historical authenticity by recreating some complex dishes from the 1900s such as Trout in Port Wine Sauce, Duck with Apples and Calvados, Porkchops



with Sauce Robert, and Caviar Croutes. Interspersed between recipes are notes and suggestions for how to serve, eat, drink, and host in Edwardian fashion.




For a more laid back gathering, try **The Unofficial Ted Lasso Cookbook**, which is perfect for game day gatherings! The book includes comfort foods like pigs in a blanket, fish and chips, shepherd's pie, pulled pork sandwiches, and goldfish mix. While not all recipes are from the show, the ones that are contain the season and episode number and title so you can stream while you cook!

Sorcerers of all types will find something they love in *The Wizard's Cookbook* which features recipes inspired by many famous franchises including *Bewitched, Doctor Strange, The Lord of the Rings, DuckTales, Zelda, Mary Poppins, Narnia, The Wizard of Oz, World of Warcraft,* and so many more! There's a handy pop culture guide at the very start of the book because it's nearly impossible for any one person to know



every franchise. The book organizes its recipes into every day, special days, treats, and potions with varying levels of difficulty, plenty of nerdy references and gorgeously magical photos.



Finally, for *Star Wars* fans there is *The Padawan Cookbook* featuring family-friendly recipes organized by difficulty and themed as padawan cooking trials. The very first recipe in the lineup is the iconic Blue Bantha Milk Slushie. Many of the treats in the book are simple, such as two eggs and toast or butter coconut bars. But often these simple treats include adorable presentations and names, such as "Twin Sun

Toast" or "Butter Chewies" (shaped like Chewbacca).

Whatever you decide to make at your next get together, if you use one of these books you're sure to have a unique dish—or at least an interesting story.

Sally Coleman (1928 - 2025)

A Personal Remembrance



Despite her small stature, I will always remember Sally Coleman as a giant in the history of the Wallingford Public Library. When I moved to Wallingford from New York State in the fall of 1975 as a young librarian, I was stunned by the cantankerous letters to the editor objecting to finding a location and building a new library for the community. Sally Coleman, writing in support, was being personally attacked by sharp responses in opposition. The debate, as I soon learned, had already been going on for several years and I recall thinking that I doubted whether I could stand up to such vigorous opposition. Soon after, I was hired as a reference librarian and witnessed over the next six years Sally's steadfast support for the "new" library at 200 North Main Street. As

Library Board President and member of the town appointed Building Committee, she stood strong to her values and understanding of what public library service should look like at the end of the twentieth century. Although many of us who worked with her quietly nicknamed her "The Sarge," she knew her place as a team member and was respected by all. As a board member, she helped set library policies over the years with respect for the Library Directors' professional guidance and in keeping with current and ever-changing library services. In particular, she supported an unusual arrangement of Co-Library Directors between Leslie Scherer and myself which lasted for 25 years, and, I believe, served the Library well.

As the years passed in the new building and as her terms on the Library Board ended, she continued her support on the Library Development Committee, especially with the sale of used books and with the 2005 building expansion. It was my pleasure to attend a special and well-deserved event at the library in 2018 in recognition of her 50 years of service at the Wallingford Public Library. At that event, Sally brushed off accolades as her motives were never personal. She dedicated her adult life to her family and the library. Her legacy is the vibrant community treasure that the Wallingford Library is today and I am grateful for the years I worked with her.

Much of what I have done is left unfinished... not because I left it too soon, not because I was lazy, but because it had a life of its own that continues without me.
