Wild Turkeys of Connecticut

Tuesday, Nov 4th | 7-8pm | Community Room & Zoom | Register

Wild turkeys were abundant when settlers first came to America. It is said their numbers throughout the original thirteen Colonies were in the millions. But they dwindled so rapidly as a result of game hunting, severe winters, and habitat loss that they were endangered by the mid-nineteenth century. Restoration efforts began in the 1970s, with the relocation of free-roaming wild turkeys from other areas of the U.S. to help replenish our wild turkey population. It is now commonplace to see turkeys while driving around New England. Master Wildlife Conservationist Ginny Apple will discuss the wild turkeys of Connecticut and their role in early America, as well as their habitats, eating habits, mating rituals and offspring. She will also debunk the rumor that Ben Franklin insisted our National Symbol be the wild turkey!







Community, Power, and the Search for Indigenous Identity Wednesday, Nov 5th | 2-3pm | Zoom | Register



In Nothing More of This Land: Community, Power, and the Search for Indigenous Identity, Joseph Lee explores Indigenous identity near the "island paradise" of Martha's Vineyard. Growing up Aquinnah Wampanoaq, Joseph Lee grappled with what it means to be an Indigenous person in the world today, especially as tribal land, culture, and community face new threats. Starting with the story of his own tribe, which is from Martha's Vineyard, Lee tackles key questions around Indigenous identity and the legacy of colonialism.

Joseph Lee is an Aquinnah Wampanoag writer based in New York City. He has an MFA from Columbia University and teaches creative writing at Mercy University.




The Search for Truth and the Persistence of Love Across Time

In July of 1962, a Mi'kmag family from Nova Scotia arrives in Maine to pick blueberries for the summer. Weeks later, four-year-old Ruthie vanishes. She is last seen by her six-year-old brother, Joe, sitting on a favorite rock at the edge of a berry field. In Maine, a young girl named Norma grows up as the only child of a wealthy family. Her father is emotionally distant, her mother frustratingly overprotective. Norma is often troubled by recurring dreams and visions that seem more like memories than imagination. As she grows older, Norma realizes that there is something her parents aren't telling her. *The Berry Pickers* is an intimate portrait of race, love, loneliness and the power of forgiveness.

Amanda Peters is a mixed-race woman of Mi'kmaq and European descent who was born and raised in Nova Scotia. The Berry Pickers is her debut novel. It won the Barnes and Noble Discover Prize and the Carnegie Medal for Excellence in Fiction and has been translated into 16 languages.




Cardholder Perks for Scientists

Do you enjoy exploring the natural world, gazing at the night sky, or discovering what makes things tick? If you love science but prefer hands-on learning over reading a book, you might be surprised to hear that the library has something for you too! **The Library of Things** offers a variety of equipment that can help you get started with your scientific discoveries! (walpublib.org/LibraryofThings)



If you find yourself looking up at the night sky and squinting to see if that bright light is a star or a planet (or maybe even a UFO), borrow the library's **telescope** so that you can get a closer look! For those whose stargazing adventures may require a more portable option, check out our **astronomy binoculars**! These binoculars are also perfect for daytime activities like birdwatching.

Are you more interested in getting an up-close view of things here on Earth? Borrow the library's **Foldscope microscope** to view tiny things like bacteria, blood cells, and single-celled organisms or get close up and personal with larger things like insects and tissue samples!



For budding scientists, the Children's Department has many STEM kits available to borrow, making learning fun and engaging for children. For students learning about physics, the Teen Library of Things offers a **Gravitrax Set** that allows users to build interactive tracks and learn about gravity, magnetism and kinetics. Is your teen thinking about a career in computer science or engineering? Borrow the library's **Solar Robot** or the **Mechanical Coding Robot** for a hands-on learning experience!

Stay informed about the latest developments in science with our collection of science magazines, including *Scientific American*, *Smithsonian*, *Discover*, *Natural History*, and *Sky & Telescope*. For those who enjoy watching science and nature documentaries, you will find many available to stream for free on Kanopy. (walpublib.org/Kanopy).



The library offers **discount passes to a number of science museums** in the area including Children's Museum & Roaring Brook Nature Center, Everwonder Children's Museum, Sacred Heart University's Discovery Science Center & Planetarium, and Springfield Museums. These passes can be reserved up to 30 days in advance and most can be printed from home (<u>walpublib.org/DiscountPasses</u>). The library also offers discount coupons to the Connecticut Science Center in Hartford. No reservation is needed for these coupons. Just stop by the Information Desk to pick one up.

When interviewed on his research, Dr. Riley Moynes commented, "I wish I knew then what I know now about the psychological challenges that accompany retirement. It would have made things much clearer and easier." By interviewing hundreds of retirees, he has discovered a framework that can help make more sense of this challenging chapter of our lives...one that, for many, could last for 30 years or more. If you're retired, this talk will make things much clearer for you. If you're not, you'll have a better idea of what to expect when that time comes.



The Dinner Party by Viola van de Sandt — The story of a dinner party, from its careful preparation through its explosive finish, that includes the competing tensions of love, grief and female rage.

The Eleventh Hour by Salman Rushdie — A short-story collection that explores death and living.

Evensong by Stewart O'Nan — Emily Maxwell, the protagonist of three earlier O'Nan novels, is now a member of the Humpty Dumpty Club, a group of older women who help and support others through life's challenges.

Helm by Sarah Hall — A fictional history of Northern England and climate change told by a ferocious and mischievous wind.



Her One Regret by Donna Freitas — A real estate agent vanishes from a Rhode Island supermarket parking lot, and her nine-month-old daughter is left crying in a shopping cart.

Ladies in Waiting by Adriana Trigiani et. al. — Forgotten characters from Jane Austen's novels experience their own happy endings.



The Land in Winter by Andrew Miller — During the harsh winter of 1962, the lives of two married couples start to unravel. Shortlisted for the 2025 Booker Prize for Fiction.

Lucky Seed by Justinian Huang — The matriarch of a wealthy family pushes her gay nephew to produce an heir to carry on their lineage.

Palaver by Bryan Washington — A mother arrives at her estranged son's Tokyo apartment for the first time in 12 years because his tone during their very sporadic phone calls worried her. Shortlisted for the National Book Award for Fiction.










Last Words:

Thank You for Your Service from Chris Ciemniewski

While we civilians sometimes take Veterans Day for granted as another holiday off from work, the day serves as a moment to remind ourselves of the experiences that service members have endured to secure American liberties across generations. It's a duty that many of us thankfully will never have to know firsthand, but through the books and writings of those who served their country, we can better understand what it means for these individuals to have fought for their country.



Walk in my Combat Boots is a collection of interviews with service members compiled by First Sergeant Matt Eversmann and bestselling author James Patterson in 2021. The book contains nearly a hundred stories from different service members, each beginning with a brief biographical sketch of the person before they provide a personal war

story, from Vietnam to Afghanistan. Most of the stories are succinct and can be read in a few minutes, but their content

is no less powerful for their short length. Eversmann and Patterson set out to educate readers on what we are thanking our miliary personnel for when we thank them for their service. A similar collection of stories can be found in Voices of War, published by National Geographic in 2004. This collection of first-hand accounts, heightened by the inclusion of photographs, aims to bring the personal experiences of war to readers in one of the first books of its kind. And for those seeking the most raw emotions that interviews cannot provide, try **Grace Under Fire** edited by Andrew Carroll, a collection of letters from soldiers about faith during times of war.



It's important to remember that members of the armed forces are just as diverse as the civilian population: they don't just fight for us; they represent us on


the battlefield. My Queer War by James Lord is a war story, but also a love story, about a twenty-one year old soldier who experiences the thrill of first love and the chill of disillusionment with his fellow man while fighting for the United States

during World War II. When the United States entered the war in 1941, it was the first time the government actively sought out women to serve. The Women with Silver Wings by Katherine Sharp Landdeck is a comprehensive account of those women airforce pilots who served during World War II after the attack on Pearl Harbor. Each chapter is dedicated to a different pilot who tells her unique story. Half **American** by Matthew F. Delmont explores the complicated situation of Black service members during World War II fighting for a country where Black civilians did not all have the right to vote. The book touches on the segregation of Black infantries, the hypocrisy of fighting fascism while racist

infrastructures still existed in the United States, and the civil rights heroes who advocated for Black soldiers, veterans, and their families.



For some service members, the armed forces are part of their family history. For others it is a matter of uncovering the history of our grandparents or great-grandparents who fought in the wars. The Time Left Between Us by Alicia DeFonzo "bridges the gap between the generation who fought in World War II and the generation who has forgotten it." DeFonzo traces the steps of her grandfather's





tour through World War II in Europe. She even inherits a Nazi journal from her grandfather and visits Germany to confront the diary owner's family. Similarly, in *Invisible* Generals, author Doug Melville begins exploring his own family's military history across five generations from post-Civil War America to the American wars in Asia. Along the way he discovers inspiring stories of some of America's first Black generals and realizes that if he doesn't tell their stories, they would be lost forever.



llaria Dagnini Brey's *The Venus Fixers* reminds readers that soldiers in World War II weren't just fighting against fascism but were also fighting to preserve a cultural legacy. The book recounts the story of soldiers who partnered with historians, architects, and artists to preserve priceless masterworks as the Nazis pillaged and looted Europe. Without these brave soldiers many of Europe's greatest treasures may have been lost forever. In Who Can Hold the Sea, author James D. Hornfischer

discusses how, even as World War II drew to a close, enlistment in the United States Navy grew as the realization set in that controlling the oceans would be instrumental in securing global peace. What began as a peacetime expansion quickly turned into a Cold War as former Soviet allies began to antagonize the United States, in turn creating the need for an even more powerful navy. The book is a comprehensive look at the United States Navy at its height between 1945 and 1960.






THE WOMEN

WITH SILVER

Today many veterans look back upon the wars they fought in with mixed sentiments. Paths of Dissent, compiled by Andrew Bacevish, is a collection of fifteen essays from soldiers of a variety of ranks speaking out against America's misguided wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. A common theme in all these essays is a description of their aspirational motivations for serving, followed by a slow disillusionment. **Down Along with**

that Devil's Bones by Connor Towne O'Neill offers a critique of Civil War monuments. While visiting Selma, Alabama, O'Neill came across a group of white supremacists attempting to erect a monument to a notorious Confederate War general in remembrance of their heritage. He goes on to describe how these monuments only memorialize hatred, not heritage, and comes to the realization that the Civil War is still being fought today through these monuments. In *An American*





Dreamer, Iraq War veteran David Finkel addresses his feelings on a divided nation and attempts to get to the core of what he fights for and his values of American fairness, honesty, and respect. The book is a lament of frustration that everything he fought for may be for naught. For Love of Country by Howard Schultz and Rajiv Chandrasekaran offers a look at what Veterans' experiences can teach us about

"citizenship, heroism, and sacrifice." Rather than examining their past experiences during wars, the book looks at the present day lives of veterans and what they are doing to help communities after they return from service. Whether on the battlefield or providing aid at home after a natural disaster, the book shows that in their best moments a soldier is not only a fighter, but is also someone who provides exceptional service to anyone in need.


