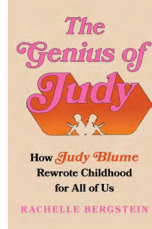
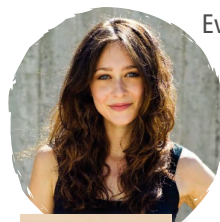
Join us for a conversation with **Liann Zhang** as she chats with us about her debut thriller *Julie Chan is Dead*. Julie Chan has nothing. Her twin sister has everything. Except a pulse. Julie Chan, a supermarket cashier with nothing to lose finds herself thrust into the glamorous yet perilous world of her late twin sister, Chloe, a popular influencer. Separated at a young age, the identical twins were polar opposites and rarely spoke, except for one viral video that Chloe initiated. When Julie discovers Chloe's lifeless body under mysterious circumstances, she seizes the chance to live the life she's always envied. But Julie soon realizes that Chloe's seemingly picture-perfect life was anything but perfect. As events spiral out of control, Julie uncovers the sinister forces that may have led to her sister's demise and realizes she might be the next target.

**Liann Zhang** is a second-generation Chinese Canadian who splits her time between Vancouver and Toronto. After a short stint as a skincare content creator, she graduated from the University of Toronto with a degree in psychology and criminology. *Julie Chan Is Dead* is her first novel.

### Rachelle Bergstein

**How Judy Blume Rewrote  
Childhood for All of Us**

Everyone knows Judy Blume. Her books have sold tens of millions of copies over the decades. But why were people so drawn to them? And why are we still talking about them in the 21st century? In *The Genius of Judy*, Blume's story is revealed as never before, beginning when she was a young mother of two searching for purpose outside of her home in 1960s suburban New Jersey. The books she wrote featured regular children with genuine thoughts and problems. But behind those deceptively simple tales, Blume explored the pillars of the growing women's rights movement, in which girls and women were entitled to careers, bodily autonomy, fulfilling relationships and even sexual pleasure. Blume wasn't trying to be a revolutionary—she just wanted to tell honest stories—but in doing so, she created a culture-altering vision of modern adolescence. Blume's bravery provoked backlash, making her the country's most-banned author in the mid-1980s. This is the story of how a housewife became a groundbreaking artist, and how generations of empowered fans are her legacy.

**Rachelle Bergstein** is a lifestyle writer, author and editor whose work has appeared in *The New York Times*. She is the author of three books: *Women from the Ankle Down*, *Brilliance and Fire*, and *The Genius of Judy*. She lives with her husband and son in Brooklyn.

## Cardholder Perks for Crocheters



The other day, I saw the cutest little critter! (No, it wasn't the kind that you'd see scurrying through your backyard.) What I actually saw was a handmade, crocheted animal with a cute little face, and I just knew I had to try to make one for myself. I did wonder if I *could*, because the last afghan I attempted to crochet ended up in the shape of a triangle!

I gave away my crochet hooks and yarn a long time ago. Because I didn't want to purchase those items again, I borrowed the library's **Crochet Kit**, which contained 14 different sized crochet hooks and an instruction booklet. Plus, there was free yarn available in the **Collaboratory**! I was all set to try crocheting. Again. I had to remind myself, it usually takes more than one attempt to become proficient at something.

With my kit in hand, I asked one of the friendly librarians at the Information Desk where I could find books on how to crochet *amigurumi*, a Japanese word for a small crocheted doll. They pointed me to **746.434 in the Nonfiction** section. After browsing through a few books, I found the perfect pattern for my little creature.

Initially, what I saw in my borrowed book seemed a little too advanced for me, so I found some beginner books on crocheting which explained the basics. The library had plenty of books, but since I'm really a visual learner, I was pleased to learn that I could also view a **streaming** TV series called *Craftsy* (available on **Hoopla**) with an expert guide who demonstrated various crochet techniques. All of these resources helped me get ready to make my *amigurumi* animal.

I am still working on my amigurumi and am making great progress. When it's done, I can move on to all the other crocheting projects I've always wanted to do. I've gotten some great ideas from the library's collection of both printed **magazines** and **e-magazines** which I borrowed through my **Libby app**.

And who knows, I might even try knitting! There's a **starter kit** for that too, plus **books**, **DVDs** and **videos** on **UniversalClass**. I plan to check out the knitting group that meets at the library – I hear that it's a fun crowd!

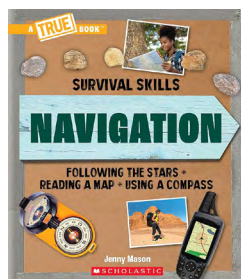
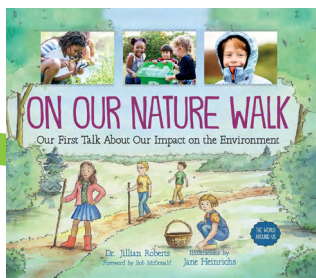

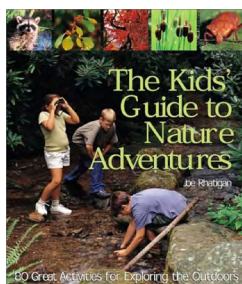
**Hiking GPS** is a durable device that uses satellite tracking to show your constant location, helping you create a fun hiking adventure without the worry of getting lost.



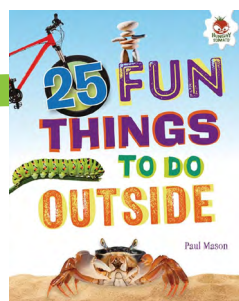
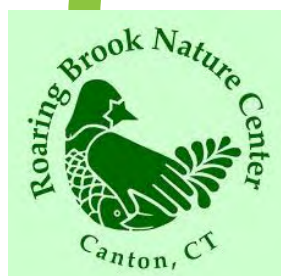
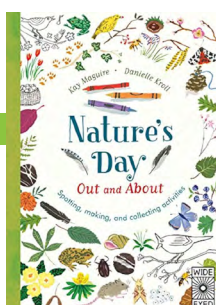

Attendants are encouraged to read/listen to these songs in advance, but no prior exposure to them is required. What's new in novels  
from Cindy Haiken



In her great novel *Jane Eyre*, Charlotte Brontë wrote "Spring drew on... and a greenness grew over those brown beds, which, freshening daily, suggested the thought that Hope traversed them at night, and left each morning brighter traces of her steps." After the April rains, it's lovely to see green grass and budding flowers, it's also wonderful to anticipate the slew of new novels heading our way throughout the month of May. Here are some of the great new fiction titles scheduled for publication this month:

***Austen at Sea* by Natalie Jenner** — Two American sisters and a pair of rare book dealers pay a visit to Jane Austen's last surviving sibling.

***Awake in a Floating City* by Susanna Kwan** — In a flooded future San Francisco, a woman works as a caretaker for an elderly neighbor in her apartment building.



***The Book of Records* by Madeleine Thien** — A woman and her father arrive at an enclave called The Sea, a staging post between migrations, where they meet a disparate group of people.

***The Boy from the Sea* by Garrett Carr** — In Ireland in 1973, a baby boy is found on the beach of a close-knit fishing village and grows into a strange but charismatic young man.

***The Dark Maestro* by Brendan Slocumb** — After their FBI agent/drug dealer father implicates his boss, the whole family enters the Witness Protection Program.

***The Devil Three Times* by Rickey Fayne** — Eight generations of a Black family in West Tennessee are repeatedly visited by the Devil.



***Fever Beach* by Carl Hiassen** — An incompetent right-wing extremist is on an errand that leads him into the depths of greed and corruption, which is complicated by a couple of feisty adversaries.

***The Emperor of Gladness* by Ocean Vuong** — A 19-year-old boy who is contemplating suicide becomes a caregiver for an elderly woman struggling with dementia.

***Heart, Be at Peace* by Donal Ryan** — 21 different people living in a small town in rural Ireland explore the forces that both divide them and bring them together.

***It's a Love Story* by Annabel Monaghan** — A woman who is a former child TV star tries to be taken seriously as a Hollywood studio executive.



***Lloyd McNeil's Last Ride* by Will Leitch** — A man learns that he has months to live and decides to die in the line of duty in order to provide for his teenage son.

***The Love Haters* by Katherine Center** — A woman pretends to be the girlfriend of one brother to line up a career-making gig profiling the other.

***Marble Hall Murders* by Anthony Horowitz** — In this third installment in the bestselling series, editor Susan Ryeland has left her Greek island, her hotel and her Greek boyfriend in search of a new life back in England.



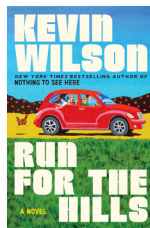
***The Martha's Vineyard Beach and Book Club* by Martha Hall Kelly** — In 1942, the US Army arrives on Martha's Vineyard, and teenage sisters spot German U-boats lurking offshore.

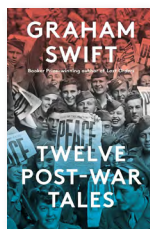
***Run for the Hills* by Kevin Wilson** — Half siblings go on a road trip in search of their father and any other relatives they can find along the way.

# Last Words:

## Celestial Parks from Chris Ciemniewski

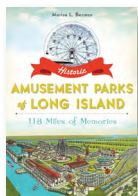
"BEYOND THIS GATE FIND GARDENS GREEN AND EPIC WORLDS TO FILL YOUR DREAMS."

This is the inscription over the entrance to Universal Orlando's Epic Universe, a brand new theme park opening on May 22<sup>nd</sup>. As a theme park enthusiast I've been following the media previews closely, and while the four lands based on intellectual properties (Nintendo, Harry Potter, How to Train Your Dragon, and Universal Classic Monsters) truly seem epic, it's the park's central hub, Celestial Park, that has been the most surprisingly interesting aspect for me to learn about as a lover of amusement park history.

After passing beneath the inscription and the park's entrance structure, the Chronos tower, guests find themselves in Celestial Park, the sprawling central spine of Epic Universe. It contains shops, restaurants, gardens, water features, a roller coaster, and a carousel, each incorporating an astrological theme. Within the park's lore, this space functions similarly to Narnia's "wood between the worlds" and features portals around its periphery, powered by the Chronos device, that can transport guests to other themed lands. The day of your visit happens to be the day when these worlds align and their portals open around Celestial Park. Celestial Park is the only themed area not based on an existing intellectual property, but it is instead inspired by the aesthetics of early amusement parks. Let's step through the Chronos and take a look at the parks of yesteryear that inspired the epic hub area of Universal's latest theme park.

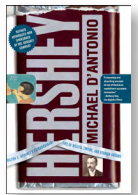
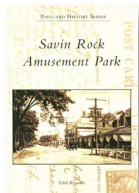


The earliest theme parks often began as picnic groves or recreational parks with grassy fields and gardens on the edge of a lake or beach. Connecticut's very own Lake Compounce had its origins as one such picnic grove, featuring swimming, boating, and lakeside concerts. Around the turn of the century the park added a carousel and a roller coaster, which today are staples of most amusement park attraction lineups. While still quaint by today's amusement park standards, Lake Compounce remains the oldest continuously operating amusement park in the United States.



Throughout the late 1800s and early 1900s, amusement parks like Lake Compounce could be found throughout the northeast United States. Two books in our collection **Amusement Parks of Long Island** and **A Century of Fun: A Pictorial History of New England Amusement Parks** take a look back at this time period of fledgling amusement parks, including Connecticut's only other park still in operation, Quassy Amusement Park. Coney Island's Luna Park

featured an impressively lit entry arch, dream-like architecture, and twinkling popcorn lights, encouraging guests to stay into the evening. Growing up in Connecticut, I would often hear my grandparents tell stories of their youth visiting Savin Rock Amusement Park in West Haven which had its own origin as a beachside pleasure pier before adding many roller coasters and other rides over the years.

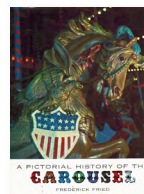


Hersheypark, another classic amusement park that has survived to the present day, had its beginnings as a recreational park for Hershey factory employees. Roller coasters and other attractions were added over time. Hershey, PA and Hersheypark have an intertwined history chronicled in **Hershey** by Michael D'Antonio. Although many people associate the Hershey name with chocolate, Milton Hershey was also influential in his establishment of schools, housing, charitable organizations, and funding of scientific research. Hersheypark was an extension of his belief in improving the well-being of the community.

Without mass media at the time, these fledgling amusement parks often lacked deep theming and instead incorporated widely known imagery and mythology into the aesthetics of the parks, naming their fastest wooden roller coasters after celestial bodies like "The Comet" or "The Big Dipper." Scott Rutherford's **Roller Coasters** highlights the origins and development of early wooden roller coasters from scenic railways into racing thrill rides. The book traces not only



the evolution of the roller coaster from wooden hills to tangled steel, but also the history of many famous and well-loved amusement parks. Similarly, **Ticket to Ride** by Patrick Hook is a comprehensive handbook of roller coasters, beginning with common models and then listing nearly every American roller coaster, year-by-year with stats, ride descriptions, and historical facts.

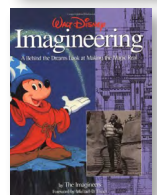


Like roller coasters, carousels became essential attractions at many early amusement parks whose origins they predate. While horses have always been the common animals for carousels, in **A Pictorial History of the Carousel** by Frederick Fried, it is noted that "every conceivable creature to be found on Noah's ark (and some not to be found there) were crafted by carousel carvers." He goes on to showcase in pictures the evolution and different styles of vintage carousels including their fairytale, folklore, and history-inspired painted panels.



With the opening of Disneyland in 1955, as chronicled in Richard Snow's **Disney's Land**, amusement parks began to transition to fully fledged theme parks in which immersion and adherence to specific themes replaced the light fairytale and mythological theming of the early amusement parks. At first these areas were similarly inspired by earlier works.

Jason Surrall's **Haunted Mansion** is a deep dive into the many inspirations behind the Haunted Mansion and **Imagineering** similarly describes how original concepts make it from idea to reality. However, with their now vast library of films both Disney and Universal have moved towards theming their lands after intellectual properties of their own. Celestial Park in contrast is meant to be a callback to classic amusement park design. But even with its quaint atmosphere, it incorporates modern twists. For instance, on Constellation Carousel guests do not sit on horses. Instead, they ride on a menagerie of colorful animals found within the constellations of the night sky. And instead of one rotation around the center, the animals appear to dance around on multiple rotating platforms. Celestial Park also features a comet-themed racing coaster, Stardust Racers. The track of the coaster is not illuminated at night, but instead the trains themselves are lit to look like fiery comets, giving the illusion that they are racing across the night sky.



And just as Celestial Park's attractions harken back to the earliest amusement park days, the celestial theme reminds visitors of some of our oldest stories. As described in **Tales of the Night Sky**, the stars were the inspiration for some of humanity's earliest storytelling devices in the form of the constellations and the movement of the planetary bodies. While storytelling has evolved over time into blockbuster entertainment like the highly immersive lands found through the portals, Celestial Park reminds us of all of storytelling's star-gazing origins.

Celestial Park is bookended by two statues of mythological figures at opposite ends of the park: Helios and Luna. During the day Helios shoots the sun on an arrow over the park, but after sunset, Luna floats the moon across the park's waterways and lights up the pathways, gardens, and attractions like twinkling stars, creating the feeling of a surreal amusement park that never was and always will be—an amusement park of our collective dreams.

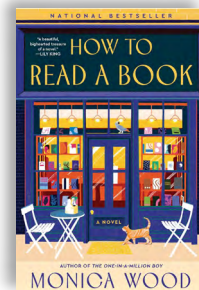

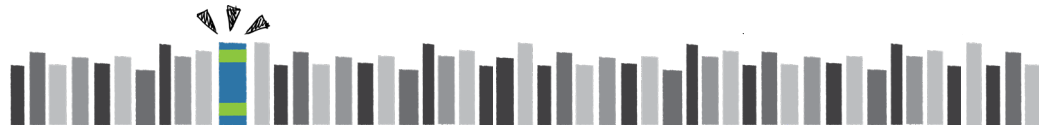
