African Drumming in CT: A History & Demonstration Tuesday, June 17th | 7-8pm


















In her poignant YA novel *I Heart You, You Haunt Me*, Lisa Schroeder writes: "Come with me...to the library. Books and summer go together." It's hard to disagree with that observation! Days of Light by Megan Hunter — A chronicle of six pivotal days across six decades in the life of a large bohemian family.

The Four Engagement Rings of Sybil Rain by Hannah Brown — A woman uses hotel vouchers from her canceled honeymoon to book a resort vacation and finds herself juggling multiple ex-fiancés.

Fulfillment by Lee Cole — Two half-brothers grapple with the complexities of class and privilege in the American South.

The Girls who Grew Big by Leila Mottley — A fierce group of teenage mothers live together in a small town on the Florida panhandle.

The Homemade God by Rachel Joyce — During a summer heatwave, four siblings gather at the family lake house to confront their father, a famous artist, who is working on his long-awaited masterpiece.



I'll Be Right Here by Amy Bloom — A teenager immigrates to New York from Paris after WWII and makes lifelong friends.

King of Ashes by S.A. Cosby — A man returns home and discovers that his younger brother is in debt to dangerous criminals, who are demanding payment.

A Murder for Miss Hortense by Mel Pennant — A retired nurse immigrates from Jamaica to England and must solve a murder in order to save herself and the community she loves.




Murder Takes a Vacation by Laura Lippman — A middle-aged widow takes a river cruise and gets caught up with flirtatious men and stolen art.

The Stolen Life of Colette Marceau by Kristin Harmel — Two jewel thieves work side by side in Paris to fund the Resistance during WWII.

Welcome to Murder Week by Karen Dukess — An American woman travels to Britain after she finds tickets her late mother had purchased for a murder mystery simulation in a small British town.

Last Words:

The Prism of Time from Chris Ciemniewski

Since its release in 1975 *The Rocky Horror Picture Show* has become one of the most well-known and endearing cult classic queer films and has helped to pave the way for more LGBTQ+ representation in media. And while *Rocky Horror* continues to stand the test of time, every generation has its own queer media. Here's a look at some films and books from across the decades that you might enjoy during Pride month this year!




If you enjoy the campy thrills of *Rocky Horror*, you may like one of the first vampire novels, *Carmilla* by Joseph Sheridan Le Fanu. Predating Bram Stoker's *Dracula* by 25 years, the story uses the concept of vampirism to explore lesbian themes. In the novel the protagonist Laura is pursued by the vampire Carmilla. However, in contrast to later vampire works which used vampires to represent foreign threats to society, Le Fanu portrays the relationship


between the two women as one of a consensual and mutual love, challenging the Victorian norms of the time.



In the United States Walt Whitman was an early voice for the gay community, especially in his poetry collection and magnum opus, *Leaves of Grass*. Challenging conventional ideas of love, Whitman wrote his poetry in celebration of same-sex love, particularly between two men, and also of self love and learning to be comfortable with the person you are and how you love.

James Baldwin would tackle similar themes in his 1956 novel *Giovanni's Room*. David is left alone by his girlfriend in Paris while she considers whether to marry him. During his time in Paris he engages in an affair with a man named Giovanni forcing David to come to terms with what it means to be bisexual and what it says about his own masculinity and society's expectations for men.





Released only a year after *Rocky Horror*, Nicolas Roeg's *The Man Who Fell to Earth* is a film that can be seen as an expression of the complexities of navigating a binary world as a queer person. In the movie, the main character Thomas is an alien who arrives on Earth and over years is able to master the societal systems that humans have created. While the character isn't explicitly queer, the decision to cast David Bowie was done to emphasize the

character's androgyny and asexuality, challenging the notion that there are only two genders.

1996's *The Birdcage* was another landmark film for gay representation. The comedy features actors Robin Williams and Nathan Lane as a healthy and happily married gay couple who must attempt to hide their queerness in an effort to appease the conservative parents of their son's fiancée. The film contrasts the gay couple's compassionate relationship with the dysfunction of the bride's parents' relationship, ultimately showing viewers that any relationship can be happy or toxic regardless of sexuality.



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Released in the same year as *The Birdcage*, *The Watermelon Woman* is a movie for both queer people and film lovers. Noticing how Black women are not credited for their roles in old Hollywood films, the protagonist and lesbian Cheryl sets out on a mission to identify the actress from *Plantation Memories* who is credited only as "The Watermelon Woman." Unlike a

lot of queer media, the narrative does not revolve around a romance, but is instead motivated by a sense of justice. While still exploring how sexuality is important to identity, it shows how humans are multifaceted, often identifying as many things at once and that sexuality is only one aspect of anyone's personality.



Similarly the 2016 film *Moonlight* is a coming-of-age drama that explores the intersection of sexuality and race and the complexities of being both Black and gay. Taking place over three different stages in the main character's life, it also examines how we reconcile our identities in different ways at different ages.



It can often be difficult to parse sexuality from gender identity, but two books that do an effective job are *Every Day* by David Levithan and *The Left Hand of Darkness* by Ursula Le Guin. These works of speculative fiction, written decades apart, help readers to understand what it must be like to identify as something other than male or female. In *Every Day*, the protagonist only known as A wakes up in a

different body every day. Sometimes they inhabit a male body and other days a female body, but they lack any identity of their own and must come to terms with who they are as an individual if they aren't exclusively one or the other. Similarly in *The Left Hand of Darkness* the main character Genly is sent on a diplomatic mission to a planet whose inhabitants do not regularly have defined genders. This causes difficulties for

regularly have defined genders. This causes difficulties for the humans who are trying to understand the civilization's culture, while pointing out the flaws in our own culture, which is so rigidly informed by gender roles.





Many queer stories today have moved beyond the "struggle" of being queer in a predominantly straight society and have instead focused on representation, that is, telling a standard love story where the conflict does not arrive solely from the sexual identity of the characters, if at all. Stephen Chbosky's coming-of-age novel *The Perks of Being a Wallflower* features both straight and gueer outcasts trying their best to figure out

who they are and what their values are in a society that doesn't seem to value them. They find belonging with each other while bonding over *The Rocky Horror Picture Show*. Its a relatable story not only for queer people, but for anyone who felt like they didn't fit in growing up.

The Song of Achilles, a retelling of Homer's *Iliad*, has become a cult queer book in recent years even though Achilles' and Patroclus' sexuality is mentioned only a handful of times. When it is, what author Madeline Miller emphasizes is how *in love* they are and how they are willing to protect each other against destiny at all costs.





And finally, to end on a lighter note, *This is How You Lose the Time War* by Amal El-Mohtar and Max Gladstone is an epistolary novel and features two lesbian time agents (known only as Red and Blue) who alter timelines on behalf of their warring empires. They begin leaving taunting one-upper messages to each other which gradually evolve into flirtation and finally romance, proving that love, including queer love, is

timeless and worth fighting for—across all timelines.


