



Cardholder Perks for Vehicle Owners

Ahhh, summer is here and it's finally time to take that well-deserved beach vacation. The car is packed, you slide into the driver's seat, and....huh?...wait a minute...what's going on?...THE CAR WON'T START!! You call your trusted mechanic, but it turns out they're already away on vacation. Before you let car trouble ruin your weekend plans, the library might be able to help!

Not sure what's wrong with your vehicle? Borrow the **Auto Code Scanner** from our Library of Things to quickly diagnose the problem! This diagnostic device reads the fault codes in your vehicle and can detect problems with your airbags, brakes, ignition, transmission, or other aspects of the car. (walpublib.org/libraryofthings)

Once you've identified the source of the problem, take advantage of our online access to **Chilton Library** to find step-by-step repair procedures specific to your vehicle. Chilton Library also offers Original Equipment Manufacturer (OEM) maintenance schedules, wiring diagrams, recalls and Technical Service Bulletins (TSBs) for automobiles and light trucks, and a handy "Ask an Expert" feature where you can submit your questions to Chilton's experts. If it turns out that your old clunker is beyond repair and it's time to start looking for a new car, don't forget that your library card also provides free access to Consumer Reports! With the online version of **Consumer Reports**, you can easily find detailed, trustworthy information for just about any make and model vehicle available on the market today. 



And new books are being published this summer by the bucketful. How great is that? Here are some novels scheduled for publication in July to feed your summer mindset:



All the Men I've Loved Again by Christine Pride — A woman who is approaching 40 realizes that she is in love with the same two men she dated when she was in her early 20s.

The Art of Vanishing by Morgan Pager — A museum employee falls in love with a man in one of the paintings hanging on the wall.

The Banned Books of Berlin by Daisy Wood — Horrified by the rise of fascism in 1933, a law-abiding young woman in Berlin decides to do what she can to save the lives of others.

Bring the House Down by Charlotte Runcie — A theater critic at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival writes a vicious one-star review of a struggling actress with whom he had a one-night stand.



Can You Solve the Murder? by Antony Johnston — A murder takes place at a wellness retreat center, and everyone there is a suspect.

Cheesecake by Mark Kurlansky — An ancient recipe for cheesecake spreads throughout the Upper West Side, from the restaurant of a conniving landlord to the kitchens of the old-school New Yorkers he's trying to force out.

Darling Beasts by Michelle Gable — The heirs to a publishing fortune are forced into the spotlight for their father's political campaign.

The Frozen People by Elly Griffiths — A team investigating cold cases travels back in time to search for evidence.

The Goldens by Lauren Wilson — A young woman is swept into a glamorous world of fascinating influencers, glittering parties and murder.



Greenwich by Kate Broad — A teenager spends the summer living with her aunt and uncle at their mansion in Greenwich.

Ink Ribbon Red by Alex Pavesi — A group of friends plays a game where everyone chooses two players at random and then writes a short story in which one kills the other.



Love Forms by Claire Adam — A woman searches for the daughter she gave up for adoption when she was a teenager growing up in the Caribbean.

Maggie: Or, a Man and a Woman Walk into a Bar by Katie Yee — A woman receives a cancer diagnosis and learns that her husband is having an affair

Mean Moms by Emma Rosenblum — A group of wealthy Manhattan private school moms start getting a taste of exactly what they deserve, instead of what they can pay for.

The Midnight Estate by Kelly Rimmer — A woman discovers a mysterious book in her uncle's rundown mansion and is unnerved by how much the story echoes her life.




Not Quite Dead Yet by Holly Jackson — A young woman is dying of injuries she sustained during an attack and is determined to figure out who is responsible before she passes away.

He even takes moments to compare the differences in the film personas of Los Angeles and New York City. 
