## Paper Crane Mobiles: An Origami Presentation & Workshop

To mark and acknowledge the 80th anniversary of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, volunteers from the Japan Society of Greater Hartford will lead a special workshop on origami cranes & their significance in Japanese culture. After a short presentation on Sadako Sasaki, a young girl in Hiroshima who set out to fold one thousand paper cranes before her death from radiation-induced illness, they will teach us how to fold our own cranes and mount them on hanging mobiles as symbols of peace and remembrance.



## Avenues to Freedom: A Walking Tour of Wallingford's Black History Trail Tuesday, Aug 12th | 6:30-8pm | Community Room | Register

In 2020, The Wallingford Historic Preservation Trust (WHPT) embarked on research into the Black enslaved population in Wallingford from 1790 to 1840. To share this important piece of our local history, Trust President Jerry Farrell, Jr. will lead an outdoor walking tour of eight Wallingford properties with ties to enslavement. Participants will meet Jerry in the library's Community Room and begin the tour from there.




## **Truth Be Told Nonfiction Book Club**

Here are some of the new novels scheduled for publication in August to keep you cool and comfortable during the upcoming dog days:



The Battle of the Bookshops by Poppy Alexander — A woman is determined to save her grandmother's bookstore after a fancy rival shop opens up across the street.


The City Changes Its Face by Eimer McBride — 18 months after a man and a woman fall deeply in love, life and its complexities threaten their happiness.

**Dear Miss Lake** by AJ Pearce — The fourth and final installment in the bestselling series about a female journalist living in London during WWII.

A Dog in Georgia by Lauren Grodstein — A woman in the midst of a midlife crisis heads to the Republic of Georgia in search of a lost stray dog.

**Dusk** by Robbie Arnott — Twins who are out of money decide to go on a dangerous hunt for a puma that is rumored to be killing shepherds.

**Fonseca** by Jessica Francis Kane — A fictionalized account of the British author Penelope Fitzgerald's trip to Mexico in 1952 in search of a muchneeded inheritance.



**Forget Me Not** by Stacy Willingham — A woman whose sister disappeared over 20 years ago finds a diary that implicates someone she knows.

**Happy New Years** by Maya Arad — After emigrating to the United States in the mid-1960s, a woman maintains her connection to Israel by writing an annual letter to her female friends in the Middle East.

**Kiss Her Goodbye** by Lisa Gardner — A woman heads to Tucson in search of a missing Afghan refugee.

**Last Light over Galveston** by Jennifer Wright — A young woman who moves from New York to Galveston in 1900 contends with a powerful hurricane that threatens the island where she lives.



**The Locked Ward** by Sarah Pekkanen — A glamorous woman who was adopted as a newborn is accused of killing the biological daughter of her wealthy, Southern family.

**Loved One** by Aisha Muharrar — A woman finds out that her first love has died and seeks answers from his most recent ex-girlfriend about him.



**The Marigold Cottages Murder Collective** by **Jo Nichols** — After a dead body is discovered in Santa Barbara, the tenants of a group of bungalows decide to investigate.

Mrs. Christie and the Mystery Guild Library by Amanda Chapman — A book conservator and the ghost of Agatha Christie join forces to catch a killer.

*My Sister and Other Lovers* by Esther Freud — Two sisters who love each other but could not be less alike grapple with the legacy of their tumultuous youth.



**A New New Me** by Helen Oyeyemi — A woman with several different personalities struggles to make it through a normal week.

**People Like Us** by Jason Mott — Two Black writers try to find peace and belonging in a world that is filled with gun violence.

**Sheepdogs** by Elliot Ackerman — Two down-on-their luck elite paramilitary soldiers are recruited into an anonymous network that operates in the murky space between predator and prey.



**Too Old for This** by Samantha Downing — A retired serial killer's quiet life is upended by an unexpected visitor.


We Are All Guilty Here by Karin Slaughter — Two teenage girls vanish from a small town where everyone knows everyone else.

When the Cranes Fly South by Lisa Ridzén — An elderly man struggles to maintain control over his own life.





# Last Words:

## ADAPTATION(S) from Chris Ciemniewski



The story of filmmaking is one of adaptation—adapting stories for the screen and telling those stories with the technology of the times. One of the most quintessential films about adaptation is 2002's *Adaptation*. The story follows a fictionalized version of real-life screenwriter Charlie Kaufman (portrayed by Nicholas Cage) as he attempts to adapt Susan Orlean's nonfiction book *The Orchid Thief*, which is an investigation into the poaching of

rare orchids in the Florida Everglades. The film moves between different genres and tones, at times feeling like a philosophical comedy and at other times like a crime thriller. The entire viewing experience is a meditation on the kinds of things screenwriters think about when adapting a book for the screen.





Movies about filmmaking are nothing new! The iconic 1952 film *Singin' in the Rain* is a musical comedy which takes place in 1920s Hollywood during the transition from silent films to synchonized sound. Featuring dazzling dance numbers, the film follows three actors of varying degrees of talent as they turn their latest film, *Singin' in the* 

*Rain*, into a musical. In 2011 *The Artist* also recaptured the zeitgeist of this transitional era of Hollywood. Filmed in black and white and making limited use of sound, the film follows an actor who is struggling to adapt to the new era of sound while also paying homage to the silent era.





Hollywood as a place is often romanticized in the minds of filmmakers, theatergoers, and dreamers alike. 2016's **La La Land** captures the spirit of two passionate performers who fall in love while pursuing their dreams of fame in Los Angeles. But before **La La Land** the animated film **Cats Don't Dance** told a similar story of two cats

trying to become stars in an animated version of Hollywood full of human actors who discriminate against animals. In retrospect, *La La Land* feels at times like a live-action adaptation of *Cats Don't Dance*.





From silent films to sound and from blackand-white to color, films have always adapted to the latest technologies. Two of the most ground-breaking Hollywood films also happen to be adaptations of books. 1939's *The Wizard of Oz* was the first major motion picture to make full use of Technicolor with saturated sets and

backdrops. *Jurassic Park* was the first film to extensively use computer generated imagery that interacted with live sets and actors in a realistic way. Both adaptations also slighlty deviate from their source material. Whereas the film *Jurassic Park* is a suspenseful philosophical thriller, Michael Crichton's original novel focuses heavily on hard sci-fi and action sequences and the film adaptation of *The Wizard of Oz* ends at about the halfway point of the L. Frank Baum's book, skipping the second half of Dorothy's adventure entirely.

Two films that are wildly different from their source material are 1988's **Who Framed Roger Rabbit** and 2013's **The Congress**. The book **Who Censored Roger Rabbit?** follows Eddie Valiant as he investigates the murder of comic strip star Roger Rabbit in world where cartoons speak in speech bubbles and those speech bubbles can be <del>censored</del>. The film offers a nostalgic look at 1940s Hollywood (and animation in particular)






while creating a caricature of a film noir. Stanislaw Lem's novel *The Futurological Congress* does not feature filmmaking at all, but instead is a dystopian narrative featuring a government which subjects its population to a collective hallucinogenic reality. The film adaptation drops the government

conspiracy and instead positions the entertainment industry as the driving force behind a collective faux reality. It follows a fictionalized Robin Wright (*The Princess Bride*) who navigates the changing film industry as it adapts to survive in a hallucinogenic world. Both films feature fabulous 2D sequences rendered in the style of "golden age" hand drawn animation.







While many films about Hollywood glamorize showbiz, there are a number of farcical films which reveal the less sentimental side of the filmmaking industry. 2006's *For Your Consideration* follows a group of indie film actors whose film begins to receive Oscar recognition and focuses on the

surreal excitement and pressure that comes with being famous. 2016's **Hail, Caesar** is a mystery comedy set in the 1950s about a detective trying to solve the kidnapping of an actor during film production. 2017's **The Disaster Artist** is an adaptation of the nonfiction book of the same

name about the chaotic production of the 2003 film *The Room*, which is often regarded as the worst movie ever made. 2023's *Asteroid City* may be one of the most meta films about adaptation. The film introduces itself as a documentary about the production of a play titled *Asteroid City* and explores the thoughts of the actors as they ponder the motivations of their characters while the play progresses.

Somewhere between the glamor and grit that goes into making a film there is a reality. 2022's *The Fabelmans* and 1963's *8 ½* are semi-biographical studies of the lives and filmmaking philosophies of directors Stephen Spielberg and Federico Fellini, respectively.









Of course, Hollywood often looks to books for inspiration. The upcoming adaptations of *The Odyssey* from Christopher Nolan and *Frankenstein* from Guillermo del Toro del Toro highlight how books continue to be a source of inspiration for filmmakers centuries after they were written. But Hollywood also

sometimes ends up adapting itself. 1933's *King Kong* was a ground-breaking film for its use of stop-motion special effects. (This is where I would have inserted my stop-motion love letter if I had enough room.) Over the decades, *King Kong* was remade a number of times using the best technology at the time of each film's creation. However, the 2005 adaptation is the one that remains most faithful to the original 1933 film in spirit while utilizing some of the most realistic CGI that still holds up today. The 2005 remake demonstrates that while technologies change and filmmakers adapt, good storytelling is timeless.




