


Thursday Night Book Club

NOVELY What's new in novels from Cindy Haiken


In his magical novel *The Wind in the Willows*, Kenneth Grahame writes: "The rapid nightfall of mid-December had quite beset the little village as they approached it on soft feet over a first thin fall of powdery snow. Little was visible but squares of a dusky orange-red on either side of the street, where the firelight or lamplight of each cottage overflowed through the casements into the dark world without." As we approach the final month of the year and the start of the holiday season, the publishing community slows down a bit, and there are fewer new releases in December than at any other time of the year. That's the bad news. The good news is that there are still many new novels to look forward to while you contemplate the turkey, the stuffing, and the pumpkin pie. Here are some examples:

Huguette by Cara Black — A 17-year-old young woman tries to survive in post-WWII France.



Television by Lauren Rothery — An aging, A-list movie star lotteries off the entirety of his massive salary to a member of the general viewing public before taking up with a much younger model.





EXPLORATION



In January's newsletter, I began the year by talking about Astro Bot, 2024's Game of the Year, and how it was an evolution in 3D platforming video games. I wanted to close out the year by talking about another game. This year's release of Clair Obscur: Expedition 33 was another example of an evolutionary achievment in game design (and is favored to win Game of the Year for 2025). For the last decade, game developers have tried to craft a Role-Playing Game that combines

real-time action with turn-based elements, often with little mainstream success—until Clair Obscur. The game utilizes turn-based offense and real-time defense mechanics that have been praised by much of the gaming community as finally offering the perfect synthesis of the two gaming styles. Although this is its most technical achievment, Clair Obscur: Expedition 33 is also an atmospheric game with a slow burn, characterdriven narrative that hooks players in its first twenty minutes.

The story centers around the small island city of Lumière, a city reminiscent of Paris. Across a channel, on the continent, a giant woman and a stone monolith are visible. Each year an illuminated number on the monolith counts down and all of the residents of Lumière who are that age or younger are turned to flower petals in an event known as the gommage. After each gommage, an annual expedition sets out to the continent to try to understand the countdown and how to stop it, but no expedition has ever returned. The game begins on the eve Expedition 33 is set to launch. It's difficult to talk more about *Clair Obscur* in detail without spoiling its story, which continues to develop around this singular mystery. But just how its gameplay is a synthesis of game mechanics, the narrative is a blending of various ideas and imagery. So, without any spoilers, here are some other pieces of media you may enjoy if you liked Clair Obscur—or if you see media you like on this list, you may also enjoy Clair Obscur!



The town of *Lumière* bears a strong resemblance to Belle Époque Paris, even prominently featuring a rendition of the Eiffel Tower which was constructed by Gustave Eiffel during that time period. For anyone interested in this brief, but beautiful period of French history, you can check out **Dawn of the Belle Époque** for

the social and historical issues that forged the time period or **Art Nouveau: Spirit of the Belle Époque** for more information on the aesthetic look of the time period. The book *Eiffel's Tower* focuses both on Gustave's construction of Paris's now iconic tower, and on the events of the World's Fair for which the tower was built.





Players will soon discover that the artwork of this period, and artwork in general, are central to the game's


narrative. **The Man in the Red Coat** by Julian Barnes is similarly a love letter to the Belle Époque and is a fictionalized account of the life of Samuel Jean de

Pozzi, a French surgeon and the subject of a John Singer Sargent portratit. The book depicts his travels through this "beautiful age

of glamour and pleasure." The game also features allusions to French artist Pierre-Auguste Renoir. **Renoir: His Life and Works in 500 Images** is one of the most accessible books in the collection for an overview of the artist's life and works.










Although it takes place during the Belle Époque, Clair Obscur also revels in the fervor of the French Revolution, evoking works such as Victor Hugo's *Les* **Misérables.** Both Hugo's novel and *Clair Obscur* ask audiences to consider future generations, what comes after, and the place of children in a time of revolution. The many failed previous expeditions

of *Clair Obscur* also bring to mind real-life expeditions like Ernest Shackleton's failed expedition to

Antarctica, which you can learn more about in *To the* **Edges of the Earth**. The book also chronicles other antarctic expeditions from the age of exploration which set out to map the icy continent. Within the game, players can find logs from failed expeditions which provide insight for Expedition 33, showing how progress





Once Expedition 33 lands on the continent, they find themselves in a fantastical land that seems at times like Lewis Carroll's Wonderland or J.M. Barrie's Neverland. *The Writer's Map* features a collection

of imaginary lands from literature and contains fabulous new renditions of what maps of these famous fictional


places might look like. Clair Obscur also bears a striking resemblance to **Bridge to Terabithia** by Katherine Paterson. Both narratives explore how children craft imaginary places in their youth as a form of escapism and the relevance of our own imagined creations as we age out of them.



During the game's final act, it is revealed that the story at the heart of Clair Obscur is the story of a grieving family and the different ways each of the family members is processing a death. One family member grieves and moves on, another seeks revenge for the death, and another sinks into despair and longing for the past. *The*

Burrow by Melanie Cheng is a novel that also deals with the family dynamics of processing a death. In the book a family adopts a pet rabbit to help them with the grieving process, but they all have different responses to this coping method. *Ordinary* People by Judith Guest features a family that fractures due to their grief. After his brother is killed, Conrad spirals into a deep depression while his father struggles with guilt and his own identity and his mother tries to distract herself by meticulously upkeeping the home.

The Letters by Luanne Rice & Joseph Monninger features a husband and wife's differing responses to the death of their son. The husband goes on a trip to Alaska to visit his son's death site, while the mother



spends time on an island painting in solitude. The game doesn't offer a right or a wrong answer to how to deal with grief, but in true RPG fashion, there are two possible endings to the story. However, neither offers a "happy" ending for all characters, and it is up to each player's own moral interpretation to decide to which ending is the most ideal, just as there are multiple ways to grieve.

I hope this has painted a picture of *Clair Obscur:* Expedition 33 for anyone who has read this before playing and I hope those who come after playing find something new to enjoy as we count down to a new year.


